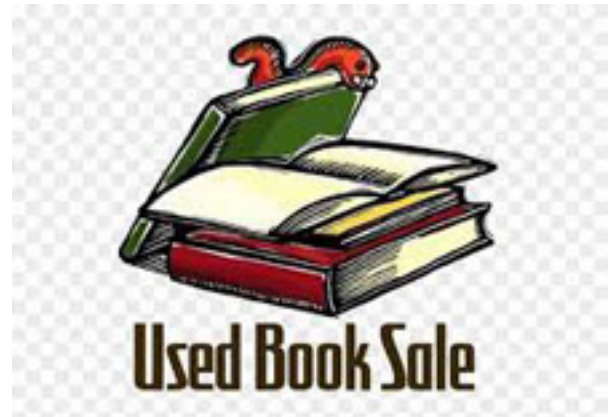

Our Stated Meeting on June 9, 2022 featured an excellent dinner beforehand, a superb program on Leadership presented by WB Ty Youngman, and delicious ice cream after the Meeting. A memorable moment during the Meeting was the announcement that, due to the dedicated efforts of Ill. Stephen P. Warren, 33° and his task force, the Valley of Canton has achieved a perfect score of 100 points in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction's (NMJ) Valley of Excellence Program! The State of Ohio leads the NMJ in the number of Valleys qualifying for the Valley of Excellence Award.

A tradition of the Valley which has grown stronger each year is the Valley's Abbott Scholarship/ CDC Graduates Night, which this year was held on Saturday June 18. On a memorable evening 11 very deserving young people received scholarships to pursue their education, while several remarkable graduates of the Children's Dyslexia Center were recognized.

One week later, on Saturday June 25, the Valley hosted its Annual Service Awards Banquet honoring those Brethren who have contributed so much to the Valley over many years.

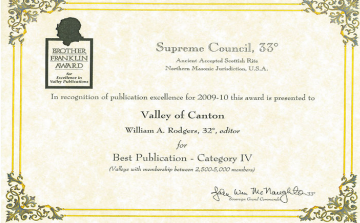

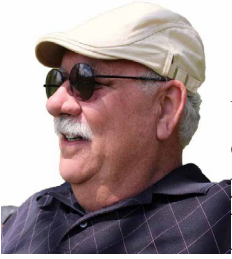

The Story of the Fourth of July

The Declaration of Independence

We celebrate American Independence Day on the Fourth of July every year. We think of July 4, 1776, as a day that represents the Declaration of Independence and the birth of the United States of America as an independent nation.

But July 4, 1776 wasn't the day that the Continental Congress decided to declare independence (they did that on July 2, 1776). It wasn't the day we started the American Revolution either (that had happened back in April 1775).

And it wasn't the day Thomas Jefferson wrote the first draft of the Declaration of Independence (that was in June 1776). Or the date on which the Declaration was delivered to Great Britain (that didn't happen until November 1776). Or the date it was signed (that was August 2, 1776).

So what did happen on July 4, 1776?

The Continental Congress approved the final wording of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. They'd been working on it for a couple of days after the draft was submitted on July 2nd and finally agreed on all of the edits and changes.

July 4, 1776, became the date that was included on the Declaration of Independence, and the fancy handwritten copy that was signed in August (the copy now displayed at the National Archives in Washington, D.C.) It's also the date that was printed on the Dunlap Broadside, the original printed copies of the Declaration that were circulated throughout the new nation. So when people thought of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776 was the date they remembered.

In contrast, we celebrate Constitution Day on September 17th of each year, the anniversary of the date the Constitution was signed, not the anniversary of the date it was approved. If we'd followed this same approach for the Declaration of Independence we'd be celebrating Independence Day on August 2nd of each year, the day the Declaration of Independence was signed!

How did the Fourth of July become a national holiday?

For the first 15 or 20 years after the Declaration was written, people didn't celebrate it much on any date. It was too new and too much else was happening in the young nation. By the 1790s, a time of bitter partisan conflicts, the Declaration had become controversial. One party, the Democratic-Republicans, admired Jefferson and the Declaration. But the other party, the Federalists, thought the Declaration was too French and too anti-British, which went against their current policies.

By 1817, John Adams complained in a letter that America seemed uninterested in its past. But that would soon change.

After the War of 1812, the Federalist party began to come apart and the new parties of the 1820s and 1830s all considered themselves inheritors of Jefferson and the Democratic-

Republicans. Printed copies of the Declaration began to circulate again, all with the date July 4, 1776, listed at the top. The deaths of Thomas Jefferson and John Adams on July 4, 1826, may even have helped to promote the idea of July 4 as an important date to be celebrated.

Celebrations of the Fourth of July became more common as the years went on and in 1870, almost a hundred years after the Declaration was written, Congress first declared July 4 to be a national holiday as part of a bill to officially recognize several holidays, including Christmas. Further legislation about national holidays, including July 4, was passed in 1939 and 1941.

HOUSEHOLD USES OF SALT

- Rub salt on fruit-stained clothes while still wet, then put them in the wash
- For mildew spots, rub in salt and some buttermilk, then let them dry in the sun.
- For split wine or fruit juice on a tablecloth, pour salt on the spot immediately to absorb the stain
- To restore some of the color to faded fabric, soak it in a strong solution of salt and water.
- Pour salt directly onto a grease spill and come back to it later.
- Sprinkle salt on carpets to dry out muddy footprints before vacuuming.
- Gargle with salt water (1/4 teaspoon salt to one cup of water) to relieve a sore throat.

HOUSEHOLD USES FOR LEMONS

- Cleaning copper pots by cutting a lemon in half and rubbing the cut side with salt until the salt sticks. Rub the lemon onto the metal, rinse with hot water and polish dry.
- A few drops of lemon juice in outdoor house-paint will keep insects away while you are painting and until the paint dries.
- To remove dried paint from glass, apply hot lemon juice with a soft cloth. Leave until nearly dry, and then wipe off.

Have you ever wondered what happened to the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

- Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died.
- Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned.
- Two lost their sons serving in the Revolutionary Army; another had two sons captured.
- Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War.
- Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the sea by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.
- Thomas McKean was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him and poverty was his reward.
- Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Rutledge and Middleton.
- At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr. noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.
- Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The British jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.
- John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside, as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished.

They signed and pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor. So take a few minutes while enjoying your Independence Day Holiday and silently thank these patriots. It's not much to ask for the price they paid. Remember; freedom is never free.
